PRESIDENT'S REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30<sup>TH</sup> JUNE 2015

SAWDUST &

It is pleasing to report that we have continued with that steady progress as in previous years. This progress can be looked at from a number of different viewpoints and I have outlined them following under various topics.

Starting with finance, we had a comfortable surplus an increase on last year and independent external financial support in the form of Grants. Our member activities contributed greatly to receipts with our Bunning's barbeques,



Cook Classic Carnival, Workshop Stall and the Gymea Fair. We had a large outlay with our dust collection system and associated items that was made possible with the very appreciative assistance from Sutherland Shire Council and the iMB bank. Both organisations took an interest in us and our community support, spent some time with us and then gave their support that has made a significant improvement to our Workshop operations and member health and safety.

A measure of progress with Charity and Toy Making activities has been the more widespread interest and time spent by members, new members showed an interest that resulted in our production of a greater variety of toys. On the 17<sup>th</sup> November 2014 we made a toy delivery to the Music & Play Therapy Children's Hospital at Randwick that totalled 1,369 items compared to 1,041 in December of the previous year. A second example was Xmas toy give away to Local Charities following on Thursday 4<sup>th</sup> December where there were 145 items, somewhat less than previous years in response to more specific requests. The John Franklin Lunch took 23, Sutherland Shire Family Services 66 and Project Youth 56 items. On the day we experienced an enjoyable, happy time with members their wives and special guests. It was great to have Mark Speakman SC and MP for Cronulla present who expressed a genuine pleasure to be with us. Also, Mr. Carmelo Pesce represented Council and in his talk mentioned that he "had no prior expectation and expressed delight to see our support" for the local charities.

In relation to the functions within our Club, we had an active & harmonious Committee who focussed and helped our members enjoy our club in a safe environment. We made good use of our sub committees whose research, thoughtful and financially (in some cases) responsible recommendations made to the Committee resulted in important decisions being made quickly. On this particular note, in July 2014 we initiated the idea of a centralised dust extraction system to effectively capture dust and chips from our equipment to a central collector. Our appointed subcommittee undertook the lengthy quite involved process of investigation with the technical complexities, types of collectors and their options and ducting design. They took a businesslike

approach, did a floor layout, field visits and designed a workshop layout with ducting sizes, machine outputs and efficiency together with interviews with potential suppliers. Also consideration was given to our neighbours and community that finally influenced our choice of collector.

The second function was the consideration of our members with a revised Plank Competition. Last year with the assistance of Roger Dixon we surveyed to canvas member interest in particular those who



declined to participate. The feedback was interesting as a number of around 13% mentioned they lacked some confidence and difficulty in deciding what to make plus there was a high number of 29% who advised they were too busy. With that in mind we developed the new format of a three group arrangement to create more interest and to meet the needs of all members, the aim to increase the participation rate and enjoyment in submitting entries. .....*continued on page 3*

In relation to general woodworking, we made a MRI Simulator delivery in July 2014 to the St George Hospital due to the great effort of Bill Lewis and Doug O'Hara. It has been a great success with the familiarisation given to both children and some adults to similarly reduce their apprehension that reduced the time spent in the Simulator with both resulting in an improvement in throughput and administration. To defray some of our costs we gratefully received some financial assistance from the Research and Healthcare provider, Bayer Australia and New Zealand



I commented in the last two years that we saw an accelerated growth and variety of high quality wood items produced in our Workshop. Again we saw this diversity now with a growing skill across members seen in varying designs of cutting boards, trucks ( some monster ones), graders, beautiful scaled cars, boxes of differing and complex designs. We had that very different wine barrel to platter by Don Williams, David Whitney with his (Dulcimer) musical instruments and Geoff Tong with his beautiful turned segmented bowls and miniature wood turning just to name a few. Warwick Tame also has shown some time consuming and very high quality items with his scaled Citroen, a 1911 Mercer Race and the Duesenberg straight eight. He also had an effective



working relationship with one of our new members Steven Lansley who has been active in toy making. In relation to Workshop safety and member health we have continued our close attention to the safe use of our power equipment particularly as we experienced increased Workshop attendances. We took the step and forwarded by email and post a "Safety Update" to all members on the 9<sup>th</sup> May and additionally made the rule and appointed a dedicated and observant safety officer on each day the Workshop is opened.

In relation to the future there will always be the challenge to continue to have our club vibrant and interesting and the new format Plank Competition forms part of this aim. We have also asked our members to please give us feedback on the new format and ways to keep our Club interesting and sociable.





As mentioned previously, it was very pleasing to see that our surplus as at 30th June 2015 that was above our previous year. It will be our continued aim to ensure that our club has no financial constraints so we can commit and pay any agreed debt when it falls due.

Our fund raising activities will continue with the iMB Cook Classic in November 2015 with raffle tickets for very attractive prizes to be sold for the club also the Bunning's barbeque, a repeat of the October Gymea Village Fair success and our November Workshop Toy sale. The consequence of these continued activities and resultant surplus will enable us to achieve our aims to be safer with up-to-date equipment, undertake repairs, acquire new options etc. to continue to grow as a Club and to provide a stimulus to our woodworking.

Continue the operational emphasis on safety with the duty safety officer, training with "hands on" use, supporting documentation, articles in our newsletters and additional to our watchful workshop Safety Officers present ask and emphasise that members be vigilant and to be ready to assist others. Additionally, further practical notes on the use on specific equipment will be made, including their connection to and the use of our new dust extraction system's operation. We will have a greatly reduced airborne dust environment and cleaner workshop. Membership and active participation numbers will be reviewed and consequently we will review our operations, such as our opening days with the continued minimum three men a day rule.

I would like to give recognition to some of our members not in any particular order and at the risk of not mentioning all those who make our club successful. Firstly, to Richard Caine for his "Chef" duties and looking after our amenities. To "all OK" Peter Mott for his amenities work and supplies with the cleaning of our dust filters and welfare reporting with Barbara his wife, who makes morning tea cakes for the committee and cakes on special occasions.

Ian Rudd has been very prominent this year with the assistance, transfer of knowledge and skills to members and has his tremendous involvement in the club, in particular with the purchase of our dust collection system where he showed a businesslike and practical input to our purchase decision.

This year there was a "handover" of responsibility to Alan Ritchie to act as Treasurer in Bill Lewis's absence. With Alan, the decision was made in the best interests of the club to move from home based PC accounting to "Cloud Accounting" solution, i.e. using a Google browser access. This gave us an opportunity to re-design our chart of accounts to meet the reporting and analysis needs of our Club. I would however, like to acknowledge the time consuming task Alan undertook with the re-entry of data with the normal very important work and then challenge and coming to grips with a new system. Alan has ensured we present a fair view of our financial transactions, all of this in addition to his safety responsibilities and Vice Presidency.

There is Barry Gardner, our editor who faithfully produces our growing Sawdust & Shavings newsletter each month. Barry also gained credit for our Club with 431 poppy stems for the Commemoration at Cronulla beach on Anzac Day. To Roger Dixon whom I nickname

"Mr Meticulous" for his detailed and thorough approach to equipment reliability, safety and secretarial support. Finally, a big thank you to Graham Ethell our Secretary. Graham's activities make him the backbone of our club with his attention to detail with communications to members, contact with external parties, administration, knowledge that add to a considerable amount of work.

As mentioned on behalf of our Committee and members we are very appreciative to all organisations for their support, in particular Sutherland Council on the 26<sup>th</sup> February when we officially received a grant with a Certificate of Appreciation and the IMB Bank at their Grant Presentation in Wollongong on 23rd June 2015 ... # **PLANK COMPETITION RULES FOR 2015**

For our future Plank competitions we have three Categories each having 1st, 2nd and 3rd prizes to total nine prizes.



- Category 1: For previous major plank winners, i.e. those that have won a 1<sup>st</sup> or 2nd prize in any past plank competitions. Members of this group have the option to use a different timber, one of their choice either from the club supply or their own in the approximate quantity, size and area of the pine plank timber purchased each year.
- Category 2: For Members that have not won a major prize, that is a 1<sup>st</sup> or 2nd prize in past plank competitions and therefore are not in Category 1. They may however, have received a lower prize in any previous plank competition and were placed in a position from 3<sup>rd</sup> to 6<sup>th</sup>. Own timber use is not permitted in this Category
- Category 3: is a novice Category. It is intended for inexperienced new members and those existing members who may require encouragement and possibly require some guidance and assistance in making an item. They might make from a variety of ideas to be advised, e.g. from some kitchen items, garden items or storage items as suggestions. Similarly, own timber use is not permitted in this Category

#### The Rules

- 1. Items can only be entered on the judging day by members of the Club.
- 2. Entries are to be made out of the plank supplied by the club and distributed by ballot except as provided in paragraph 3.
- 3. Category 1 entrants have three choices; one is to use a plank supplied by the club or to use club stock of equivalent size. In both these cases the cost is identical. The third choice is to use an entrants own timber, again of equivalent size. The plank cost is \$40.00.
- 4. In relation to eligibility there is a no restriction on the number, size, type and design of the item(s) providing they have a matching or corresponding theme and are made from the plank supplied with the addition if necessary of those items mentioned in paragraphs 5, 6 and 7.
- 5. Items may include metal fixings providing that they are restricted to the use of hinges or catches (with their screws). Clock movements are allowed and items can include wood carving and woodturning as part of an entry
- 6. Items may include other related matter such as glue, dowels, biscuits etc. for jointing etc. provided they do not exceed approximately 5% collectively of the overall item. Items may also include related matter of an aesthetic nature such as veneer, decals, glass etc., again provided they are not dominant and fall in line with the 5% requirement.
- 7. It is acceptable to finish items with oils, lacquer, poly products, paint etc.
- 8. Full use of the plank received should, where practical, be attempted and any remaining pieces are to be returned to the Club.
- 9. Entries, as finished items are to be made available for judging on our Maxi Day 12<sup>th</sup> September 2015 giving a seven (7) month period to finish your masterpieces. Entries made and presented to the Competition shall become the property of the Club to sell or to dispose at the Club's discretion, with the exception of those members who pay the cost of the club timber and those in Category 1 who supplied their own timber so both can keep their entry.
- 10. Each member with an entry will be given approximately 5 minutes prior to judging to describe their item/s and experiences to members present on the Maxiday judging day.
- 11. Judging will be undertaken by all members present.
- 12. Members present on the Maxi day above will be provided with coloured voting sheets to judge the items on the criteria namely; (a) Is it a good creative design? (b) Is it well made? and (c) Is it well finished
- 13. Voting sheets will only be provided to members for a Category/s where they have not entered an item. For example, an entrant would receive two different colour coded judging forms for two of the three Categories that are of a dissimilar colour to their Category entry. A non entrant would receive the three different colour coded forms representing the three Categories
- 14. Each member shall give a mark from 0 to 10 for the design criteria, and from 0 to 15 for the other two criteria above for each member's entry (that can be 2 or more items collectively) and after all presentations of entries and forms counted, the winner and two runners up shall be determined in each of the three categories.
- 15. The winner in each Category, with the highest number of votes, the runner-up and third placegetter will be awarded Prizes to be determined by the Committee.
- 16. It is a requirement that the winning entries entry in each Category be entered into the Al Usherwood Award competition held 12<sup>th</sup> December 2015.
- 17. The 1<sup>st</sup> prize winner in Category 3 will automatically progress to Category 2 in future competitions. The 2<sup>nd</sup> Prize winner has the option to remain in Category 3 or progress to Category 2 in future competitions.
- 18. The 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> prize winners in Category 2 progress to Category 1 for future competitions
- 19. The projects and training subcommittee shall determine any dispute exclusively. The subcommittee's decision is final and no challenge will be considered.

# SAFETY IN OUR WORKSHOP by Alan Ritchie

## Using Club Equipment Safely

Safety is the number one priority when working with the Club's (or any) powered equipment. Safety must never be sacrificed because any accident is likely to cause irreparable injury to you or fellow Club members, or damage to your workpiece or the equipment. When preparing to use any power equipment, please ensure the dust collector is turned on; the relevant dust collector gate is open; other unused gates are closed; there is airflow in the dust collector tube (that is, there is no blockage); and your workpiece is secure.

# Thicknesser.

The thicknesser will produce a workpiece with a consistent thickness.

- 1. Check that the workpiece is narrow enough to fit on the thicknesser bed without riding up onto the side ridges maximum width is about 450 mm.
- 2. If the finished workpiece will be thinner than 6 mm, attach the workpiece to a sled with double sided tape before thicknessing starts and feed the sled through.
- 3. Loosen the two lock nuts on the left hand side of the thicknesser and set the height to the current workpiece thickness using the gauge on the right hand side of the infeed bed.
- 4. Turning the height winder clockwise raises the thicknesser bed and reduces the height 1 turn changes the cutter height by about 2 mm.
- 5. Tighten the two lock nuts.
- 6. It is best to have a second person at the out feed side to handle the workpiece as it exits the thicknesser.
- 7. Turn on the power using the green button switch at the front. (The red button stops the machine).
- 8. Feed the workpiece into the thicknesser until the feed rollers grab the workpiece.
- 9. Allow the workpiece to move through.
- 10. To use all cutting blades in the thicknesser:
  - a. allow the workpiece to be angled to cut across the workpiece; or
  - b. locate different workpieces at different positions across the infeed bed.
- 11. After each pass, you do you need to turn off the thicknesser, but:
  - a. unlock the lock nuts;
  - b. raise the bed by turning the handle clock-wise:
    - i. about 1/4 to 1/2 turn (1/2 to 1 mm cut) for wide workpieces (greater than 150 mm)or for hard wood; or
    - ii. about ½ to 1 turn (1 to 2 mm cut) for narrow workpieces (not more than 150mm wide).
- 12. If you are thicknessing a short workpiece and want to ensure you get an even cut over the whole piece, particularly with no snipe as the workpiece enters the cutting blade or leaves the blade you need to use the sled and protect the leading and trailing edges of the workpiece by:
  - a. Either:
    - i. attaching the workpiece to a sled; and
    - ii. attaching a sacrificial piece of timber at least as thick as the workpiece at the front and rear of the workpiece;
  - b. or: i. attaching two sacrificial pieces at least 200 mm longer than the workpiece onto the sled on each side of the workpiece and with the workpiece located at least 100 mm from the leading edge of the sacrificial pieces.
  - c. (a) or (b) will minimise snipe on the workpiece.
- 13. If a lot of shavings stay on the work bed, check that the dust collector system is not blocked as it occasionally will block you may need to remove the elbow fitting on the dust collector outlet to remove the blockage.
