LIBRARY UPDATE



An extract from the library article I wrote for December's 2014 newsletter reads as follows:-

"It has been a rewarding year in the library with a greater number of members using the library facilities, whether browsing thru' books looking for ideas, or borrowing. Please continue by making full use of this wonderful asset."

It's a pity the same comment cannot be said for this year. As the librarian, I am disappointed and maybe disillusioned as to the importance of a library in a club such as ours.

I wonder how many members read the newsletter. A few members contribute articles on a regular basis, including the essential Committee Minutes from the Secretary each month to inform members what is happening and what is planned for our club.

The reason for raising this is that in November's newsletter, I included an article that had asked for help with a list of newly acquired books (refer the newsletter). Sadly, I was extremely disappointed that not one member, that's right, absolutely no one, took the time or could be bothered to see, or even glance through them!!

I asked myself what is the purpose of the library? Do we need a library where only a handful of members rummage through the books for ideas or maybe borrow? Is it just a reference library or am I wasting my time sitting @ a desk waiting for maybe a couple of members to borrow? I'm sorry, but I do not have the answers for some of these questions, except that for me, the library has a wealth of information & ideas ready to be tapped into. Maybe people find out all they need on the internet these days. I prefer to have a hard copy to study.

I thought it would be interesting to carry out a survey of the borrowing pattern whilst sitting in the library twiddling my thumbs!! I will share the following statistics with you:-

a) "Never Borrowed" - these figures are from mid 2010 when I introduced the new registration of books in categories and card system.

Another interesting fact is the number of different members who have borrowed books this year is 10. Obviously from the 18 books borrowed in 2016, some members have borrowed more than once!! Member Profile Ken McEwen Member 31 guild 1545



I was born 22nd September 1937 at Marrickville, some will understand the significance of that. My earliest memories are from 2 years old things associated with world war II. I remember taxies with gas producers, trucks with gas bags, blackout blinds, a thing to keep in your mouth during an air raid, sirens for warnings and the absence of young men. It was then that we moved to Kingsgrove which was very rural and like living in the country. There were 2 dairies in the neighborhood and bush to play in. The kids were pretty wild and up to all kinds of dangerous play which would cause the average parent to have a seizure today. I attended Kingsgrove public school at the usual age of 5 I was already able to read which along with being a left hander put me at odds with the teachers. The war had been going 3 years by then and the only male teachers were old. Retired female teachers were back in service with belief that everything including left handedness could be cured by flogging for which I was an obvious candidate.

Gradually extra members of the family arrived, 3 boys and many years later a girl who like me was adopted. At the end of the war I was 8 years old and seeing the newsreels of the day showing the death camps and mass burials with bulldozers I decided by the time I was 9 I would never have children I have never changed my mind since.

I attended Kogarah high school and continued to attract the cane regularly but the boy who outdid me was Ted Clay who would rotate his thumb and break the cane.

I left school at 15 as being in a large family with limited income there was no alternative. In those days the main opportunities for apprenticeships were in the railways and the PMG. Each had entrance examinations, I sat for both. The railways results came out first and although it was not my preferred option I was persuaded to take an apprenticeship as a fitter and machinist. I started work at the Eveleigh workshops. In those days everything was manufactured at the workshops which made it a good place to get wide experience. I was lucky at the start to be given a good quality lathe to work on as most others were on worn out clunkers doing boring work. The noise had to be experienced to be believed, long rows of machines were powered by huge electric motors with a shaft running the length of the bay, leather belts driving moved off idler wheels to driving wheels by a lever, they screamed as they took the load. We were next to the boiler shop which added to the din.

Accidents were common and some so extreme that I will not describe them. And stupid dangerous practical jokes were common.

The results of the PMG exam were out and I did well so decided to make the move and become a trainee technician in communications probably the best decision I could have made. I qualified at 20 as a Technician after 5 years training worked in Sydney for a couple of years then transferred to a country installation section. I spent 2 years in Canberra and was promoted to Senior tech, worked in Parliament house, Dept. of Defence Duntroon, Dept of immigration and others.

I had some experience of committees and was a scuba diver (this was new at that time). Most single workers in Canberra at the time lived in government hostels a group got together and decided to form a skindiving club.

We had some recruits from the air force who were able to fill air bottles on my scuba gear. I became the foundation president and taught the use of scuba gear to members. We would travel to the south coast at weekends.

I met my wife Kath at the hostel. As there was less work in Canberra I worked at various places on the south coast. I married at 24 then moved back to Sydney. Shortly after an opportunity to join the training section was open so I applied and was accepted. After teacher training and an assessment of my abilities I was appointed as a technical instructor I loved teaching. I was in the training section for the next 30 years retired at 55 as a principal technical officer I was then in charge of training in computer based equipment and software courses which included project management.

My interests include history Egyptian hieroglyphs, Astronomy (astro photography etc.), Shooting Muzzle loaders, collecting ancient artifacts, Electronics, computer programming and of course woodturning.

I have had lots of committee experience:- Foundation president of Canberra Skin diving club. Committee of Bankstown Blue water fishing Club. Editor of club magazine of Sydney Colonial Muzzle Loaders Club for 11 years (I am a life member). Committee member of Sutherland Astronomical Society for several years President for 2 years.

Assistant Convenor of Southern region woodturners for several years, last Convenor during reorganisation first President of the new association. I have organised some of the craft fairs and assisted with others. I have had several other functions. I am currently the Public officer and the editor of Cubby House News this is my 3rd year. I also take out the garbage.

I would like to see a few more members volunteer for positions in the club. It is not fair on those doing the work to continue indefinitely I don't think it is good for the individuals or the organisation for the same person to hold a position for too long. Unfortunately I haven't had much spare time to do much turning lately but still love it.

What I like about turning is the opportunity to let one's creative imagination take over and let the piece decide what to become. I don't like to work to a plan as most of my working life required rigid adherence to precision.

I hope that our club will flourish in the future.

I wish everybody a happy Christmas and New Year and that we have peace on earth and people stop killing each other in the stupid belief that they do god's work.




