(or is it?)


Pyrography, the art of writing, drawing images and decorating raw timber by a heated stylus was looked at during our November Maxi-day.

Thank you Ray Schofield for sending tracing shapes, alphabets and a number of square and rectangular timber pieces for the members to practice on.

Sam kindly cut a quantity of circular coaster size trivets for other slightly more ambitious projects to be tried out.

On the day it was decided to keep the projects to mainly outline shapes for participants to get the feel of the stylus and to experiment with the temperature control for darker or lighter imaging.

The three operating stations used the Club's two units plus a supplementary private set.



When a station was free for a short time, previous pyrographers came back for another try, improving with each supplementary mini session. It was gratifying that so many wanted to take their work home.



Various participants added other features and shading to the bland single outlines actual bringing a near third dimension to the image.

Thank you Warwick for the more ambitious tasks of the completion of the elegant goose coaster and for burning the little Teddy Bears to the lids of the two remaining keep sake boxes for the Children's Hospital.

I think it is fair to say that this very

fundamental introduction to the pyrography art may have whetted a few appetites to more ambitious projects ahead.

Addendum


Lynne Messenger was unable to join us on Maxi-day and missed out, but had her maiden pyrography session the following Wednesday Club day. Lynne

Pyrography is yet another treatment to timber and wood, its scope is limited only by one's imagination. Fred Seligmann





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
THE COACH BUILDERS ART


During a recent trip to Victoria we had

the good fortune to stay a couple of days in the City of Bendigo. One of its highlights is its Tramways Museum and Tourist Tram ride. Officially the Trams were part of the Public Transport network in Bendigo from 1890 and officially ceased in 1972. However Bendigo residents did not like losing their trams and so in 1973 the Tourist tram commenced operation and has been going strong ever since. In addition they have a serious refurbishment, maintenance and reconstruction operation with 23 working trams in their collection. They are currently rebuilding a tram for the Sydney Tramway museum.

One cannot but recognise the fact that what was outdated transport in the 1970's is now the new public transport. Instead of calling them trams they now call them by the buzz words "light rail". I wonder whether the workmanship quality will be in the new light rail rolling stock and whether they will still be going in 100 years as is the case with a number of the Bendigo trams.

The Bendigo Tramway Museum has restored many of their old trams. Not the least of which was one of the first (1903) electric trams. The photo at left is of the one of these trams taken in 1903. The second photo sees the tram arriving at the Bendigo workshops and the third is how it looks today in full working order.







The coach builder's art is much in evidence at Bendigo as can be seen in the following photos. One must marvel at the Tiger Maple and other woods used as well as the many brass fittings.

Each year for the last 11 years we have honoured one of our late members with an **Award of Excellence**. This award sponsored by our Club was offered to members of the Clubs who were resident at the Cubby House at Oyster Bay. Your Committee in 2012 determined that in future years the award will

be offered to members of Clubs who reside at our Lilli Pilli Workshop. Members therefore of these Clubs are offered to submit one or more wood items they have finished during the 2013 year at our meeting at the Lilli Pilli Workshop this year on Saturday, 14 December, 2013 for judging by the panel of judges. Please see the rules below.

So we look forward to you submitting that masterpiece and getting your name on the honour board for posterity.

THE RULES

- The competition will be held annually and will be called "The Al Usherwood Award for Excellence".
- The judging panel will be Bruce Leadbeater, Bill Lewis, and Alan Shoebridge.
- Should any of the judging panel enter any category of the competition or a casual vacancy exists, a replacement judge will be appointed by the other members of the judging panel for that occasion.
- 4. Without precisely defining "Excellence" the entries will be judged according to the very highest standard and no award will be issued if, in the opinion of the judging panel, those standards are not met.
- 5. The competition will be open only to financial members of the two clubs which are:
 - 4.1 The Shire Woodworking Club Inc
 - 4.2 The Woodcarvers Club
 - and includes their successors and assigns.
- 6. Any item(s) made primarily of wood is eligible for entry but must have been made by the member and been finished within the previous twelve months and can only be entered once.
- Items are eligible for entry to any section of the competition and entrants are to nominate the category for each entry submitted.

Best item or setting of furniture

Best art piece

Best utility piece

- The Al Usherwood Award for Excellence will be given to the winner of one of the four categories above if the standard is considered to be high enough.
- 9. Prizes will be as follows:

The name of the annual Excellence award winner will be recorded on a plaque mounted on a large wooden shield affixed in a prominent position on the wall of the Shire Woodworking Club premises.

- The winner will be presented with a Certificate of Excellence.
 A Certificate of Merit will be awarded to the winners of the other categories.
- 11. Entries are to be submitted to the Shire Woodworking Club Inc at the Lilli Pilli Workshop on, or before, 10:00AM on Saturday 14 December 2013. Suitable security arrangements will be made with the owners while the entries are with the Shire Woodworking Club. Judging will be completed on that date. Items are to be collected after the judging on that day.
- 12. Each entrant should complete an entry form which will include the details required in paragraphs 6 and 7 above. Entry forms will be available from the Secretary.

A lady brought this wood and brass inlay box to our Club to see if it could be restored. It was in very poor condition with no lock and some substantial damage to the key hole escutcheon area. Apparently the box belonged to her Grandfather or Great Grandfather which would make the box at least 120 to 150 years old. After doing some searches on similar boxes I believe this box would have been

made in the UK where the manufacture of these types of boxes was an industry for the wealthy.

The brass inlay was in good condition and the craftsmanship that went into this box in the 19th century was amazing.

A new brass lock was fitted and a new keyhole escutcheon was mounted on a turned piece of Rosewood to cover the damage on the front. The box was carefully scraped back to the original veneer finish, hand sanded to 400 grit and then finished with shellac similar to its original finish. *Ian Rudd*
