Our 2016 Year

We are now at that time, as in previous years, where we reflect on our last twelve months. It is an important addition to our history. We not only record our achievements as a community conscious team it also helps to generate ideas and plan for the future. Lastly, it also is an essential recognition of those individuals and organisations who have continued to support and assist us over this time.

To begin, we are pleased to convey that we have had another happy and successful year in that we have functioned well in an agreeably good manner as individuals, in our operational committee meetings and importantly as a co-ordinated team in our toy making and community support.

We have reached an early stage of maturity in a number of ways that will be visually conveyed in this document. One is the noticeable development of skills in our members in the use of an expanded range of high standard equipment. This was achieved mainly through the member to member transfer of knowledge and training as evidenced in the finished items. The second is with the realisation of our needs in terms of acquiring safe, practical Workshop equipment, in a healthier environment. Lastly there is a proactive course of actions to identify and introduce upgrades to our safety procedures on an ongoing basis. The above have been driven in part by the regular monthly viewing of informative sourced "how-to" and safety videos on our wall mounted TV. Lastly, there are the strong, long term relationships with the charities we support and the friendships we have with the local community.

The above could not be achieved without the support of those whom we consider to be close friends who represent external organisations. These are Councilor Carmelo Pesce, Mayor of Sutherland Shire, Mark Speakman SC MP, and State Member for Cronulla, Kerry Duroux, Manager of the IMB Bank, Cronulla, David Ackroyd, Manager Communities Unit, Sutherland Shire Council and lastly the Hon. Scott Morrison MP. It is very pleasing that they have been in regular contact and visited us at various times. The continued financial support of our Shire Council has allowed us to achieve a much safer work environment and this year we received a capital outlay for a much needed kitchen upgrade, one that we will undertake ourselves. Also, close friendships have been made with those in the Shire Charities and the Sydney Children's Hospital we support all of whom have openly expressed their joy and gratitude.

occasions at Oyster Bay and was pleased to see the growth and progress made with our Club as evidenced with the variety of our equipment and attendance of members in our new premises.

A VERY SPECIAL PROJECT

We were given a small but very important request for a purpose built table for a special little girl. Given the circumstances of this request it was perceived as an interesting project and enthusiastically undertaken by our super craftsmen lan Rudd and Ray Tregoning.

Shown in the image is the small table with folding legs that was built by Ian and Ray. Its design was specifically for the needs of a family who have the little four year old girl called Josie. Josie has a very rare condition called FoxG1 and her condition is one of impaired development from birth. It is complex; Josie is unable to walk or speak and has involuntary movements of her limbs together with a difficulty in learning to sit unaided or without being restrained.

The specific design of the table shows a timber rim as an elevated edge of timber around the laminated table top and has fold away legs. The edge is to help prevent her toys and learning aids falling to the floor caused by her involuntary movements. Josie, seen here in a poncho is playing with a sensory play liquid that would normally be spilt around her on their floor. The fold away legs assist in storage as



she needs more than one table with each one having legs with a different height for her respective seating and to position her closely to the table. The table was very warmly appreciated by her parents Sara and Scott.

A COMMUNITY REQUEST

A gentleman came to the Lilli Pilli Workshop front door with two chairs with broken arms that his wife tried to repair and gave up. He unfortunately had a recent stroke and was unable to fix them himself. The arms had been separated so Roger and Ian drilled out the dowels where the arm fits into the back and fitted new ones then screwed the other end to the base. Both ends were also glued with a two-part boat building glue."



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AN ENLIGHTENED SOLUTION

A request came from David Ackroyd, Manager Communities Unit, Sutherland Shire Council asking to help the Seniors Activity Unit who amongst other things provides lighting around the Shire over the Christmas period. The problem was that the leads of lights in the past were just rolled up after use and put in a steel cupboard for the following year that becomes tangled. The solution was that

they obtain some four large cable rollers so the lights could be rolled on the rollers and then stored in a purpose built metal box for next year. So Ian Rudd and Ray Tregoning made a roller stand and wooden inserts for the box, to evenly and securely store the leads. The box is seen here inserted into their metal container

We held our annual "Community Christmas Toy Give Away" at the Workshop and as usual it was a relaxing, fun day for all especially to see and experience the gratitude of our three Shire Charities. It was our fifth (5th) Give Away to be celebrated at Lilli Pilli and our eighteenth (18th) in total for our Club.

Ray De Marco opened the meeting in the morning and on behalf of all our members he extended a very warm greeting and commented that it is very pleasing to see a good attendance that included Official Guests, member wives and members on this a very special day

The wood items and knitted soft toys that were on display were made to their specific requests & needs of the charities and Ray advised that Project Youth at Miranda whom we have supported for many years have changed their direction. As a consequence they have not focused as much on children, so there is not the need for toys for this year. On display was 126 items, a decrease on last year, due their reduced needs.

Our Vice President, Malcolm Armstrong then invited our guests to say a few words and Cr. Carmelo Pesce opened by saying this was his fourth year attending this annual function and he continues to be amazed at the job the men and women of the Club have done in making all the toys. He said attending functions such as this is the most enjoyable part of his job as Mayor.







Following Mark Speakman commented on the great display of toys and the contribution the Club makes to the various organisations present. He was impressed with the quality and the time taken to produce them and quite candidly and with humour referred back to his woodworking efforts in his first year at high school which were a disappointment to his woodwork teacher.

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Lola from Sutherland Shire Family Services said this was the 6th or 7th year the club had provided toys to her organisation, starting from when we were at Oyster Bay. On behalf of the vulnerable families they support Lola conveyed how very grateful they and the Services were. Lola then presented our Club with their Certificate of Appreciation as seen at right with Ray & Malcolm.





In turn Dianne from John Franklin Christmas Lunch said the Club had also supported their organisation for many years, and last year had 540 people at the lunch. They aim to give everyone a small gift, so our donations are most welcome and said we should see the looks on the children's faces at Christmas. Dianne issued a general invitation to anyone who wishes to attend to come along this year to the lunch on Christmas Day at the Sutherland Entertainment Centre.

Graeme from Kingsway Community Care, a church-based, not for profit organisation that exists to serve the social, emotional, physical and spiritual needs of the community. Graeme said this was their first year to be involved with us and he was "blown away" with our generosity. Kingsway Community Care assists young homeless women and does a lot of work supporting and housing young families. The Kingsway Community Church also runs Jacaranda Cottage and Platform 9



amongst other initiatives for young people. They provide upwards of 150 hampers at Christmas, tailored to the specific needs of the recipients, so our donations will be especially welcome.

Malcolm presented Barbara Taaffe with a card and gift, thanking her for her continuing contribution in knitting a significant number of dolls and animal shapes for the children.

Malcolm then thanked everyone for their attendance and invited all guests to stay and enjoy morning tea with the Club members and their wives.



The Sydney Children's Hospital, Randwick UNPAINTED & MUSICAL TOYS



As in previous years we made a number of deliveries to the Child Life and Music Therapists at the Children's Hospital. Following are some examples of the work that has been done that includes some special requests. Interestingly the number of items delivered was less than last year due to two reasons; one as a direct result of specials requests and the second was the time consumed was much greater due to the more complex items.

It is Important to recap that the bulk of the items made for the Hospital in timber are in what is an unfinished, raw state and as such are purposely left for the children to apply paint in a creative manner. This is part of their therapy to decorate their items and to take them home when they leave the Hospital.



The image at left was from a December 2015 delivery that did make our last review and is worth to be included because of the merriment on this particular occasion.

Ian Rudd and Ray Tregoning were in the process of trying to tune the wooden Xylophones they made and Matt, one of the music therapists was asked to help and he obliged by having an impromptu jam session.

Not everyone is shown here however of the staff there was a year 10 work experience student on a harp, and Kerry the deputy manager on tongue drum with Matt at the rear making music with a walking stick flute. Our Club members were represented by Fred on guitar, Lyn and Ian on their Xylophones and Barry on a metal base.



During the year we received some images from the Hospital to show us how some of the items we provide are decorated by the children. Kerry Crannis advised us the owl boxes were decorated by girls between 8 and 11years. The painted guitar is from a

four year old boy whose family lives in Cronulla. The red and green paint was jokingly responded by dad saying next time will do another one and it will be in the Sharks colours.

Administration & Financial

We continue with our two monthly meetings namely the Committee and Maxiday General Member Meetings. The Committee meeting precedes the Maxiday and covers operational matters to provide a basis for decision making and future planning. These are then communicated and discussed at the following Saturday Maxiday meeting to the broader membership. Additionally in August we conduct our formal Annual General Meeting.

Our procedural formalities continue to ensure the smooth and efficient operation of our Club. It is not only for compliance purposes as a "not for profit organisation" but to ensure that each meeting is in the best interests of members in a safe and happy environment and also in consideration of community standards.

Looked at from differing viewpoints and outcomes it is not hard to acknowledge the importance of the time and committed team efforts of our Executive and those members who make up our important Sub-Committees. As a combined team we have a good mix of knowledge and skills to additionally make "business like" decisions in an open and friendly manner and ensure operational effectiveness. It has allowed our members to grow and display a wide range of increased skills with our new equipment whist operating in a safe environment.

Safety & Training

It is pleasing to record there were no major incidents during the year. This is largely due to our continued emphasis on safety, the safety activities are under constant revision and our member awareness of risk. Our regular monthly Maxi-day meetings routinely have time set aside with safe use of a selected item of equipment as seen in the image below.

This year we introduced personalised one-on-one training on the use of all equipment. This is an ongoing job as when you consider the variety of equipment and the number of members to "sign off" on each item of power equipment. We also have commenced a review of the private medical history of members in case of an emergency.

Our Executive


