




early 1900's

SAFETY FIRST: Members are asked on all club days to bring along and use their personal safety gear. ie. earplugs, dust mask and eye protection and ensure they are wearing good sturdy protective footware and no loose fitting clothes.

**NEVER EVER** attempt to route a piece of wood on the router table between the fence and the router cutter. Always cut against the rotation of the cutter.

Within the last few weeks at the workshop a member attempted to pass a piece of 30mm X 40mm Blackbut between the fence and the router cutter in the direction of the cutter rotation. The router spat out the length of hardwood at such a pace that it hit the hand tool cupboard some 4 metres away. Any member working at the engineers vice or sharpening machine would have been seriously injured.

THINK BEFORE OPERATING ANY MACHINE

overheat, Router bits that cut a lapped miter joint, 8 inch jointer with segmented cutterhead.



Here are some examples of router bit styles.



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


Your Editor undertook on a visit

## IS TRADITIONAL WOODWOOKING MOVING INTO THE 21st CENTURY?

We learn these days that Intel, the computer chip maker, has now got the distance between transistors on their latest computer chipset at 13 nanometres. In comparison the width of a human hair is 70,000 nanometres. A nanometre is one billionth of a metre. 1/1,000,000,000.

We woodworkers however never need to get down to these incredible invisible fine tolerances. However that does not mean that the power tools we use do need to be able to use computer chips using these tolerances.

A case in point is a new free handing router that is coming on

the market in September this year. It is a hand held CNC machine. See photo at right.

This router has been developed and is being marketed by Shaper Tools in the USA. It will be retailing in the USA for around US\$2,100.

It is a router that has an inbuilt computer that operates the router movement. The operator uses the inbuilt computer screen to follow lines



very similar to scroll sawing from a pasted on design. How the computer knows how and where to cut is nigh on impossible to describe. Placed on the board that is to be shaped the operator attaches disposable paper strips at irregular intervals. The camera in the router notes these strips and overlays this on the design thus enabling the router to direct the operator to move it in what direction.

Hopefully we will have a video of this machine in operation at our forthcoming Maxiday this Saturday 14 January, 2017.
